## **Outline proposal for Edgware Jewish Primary School and nursery to become a Voluntary Aided Primary School and nursery**

Edgware Jewish Primary School is a successful, single-form, independent, co-educational primary school located at 261 Hale Lane, Edgware, Middlesex, HA8 8NX, in the London Borough of Barnet. The nursery is located on the same site. The Governors of Edgware Jewish Primary School are proposing that the school and nursery move from the independent sector to become Voluntary Aided, maintained by the London Borough of Barnet.

## **CONSULTATION DOCUMENT**

### **Outline proposal for Edgware Jewish Primary School and Nursery to become a Voluntary Aided Primary School**

#### **1. Introduction**

The Governors of Edgware Jewish Primary School are proposing that the school and nursery move from the independent sector to become a Voluntary Aided school, maintained by the London Borough of Barnet.

The process for bringing an independent school and nursery into the maintained sector is set out in Government guidance. One of the early steps is carrying out a consultation exercise to elicit views from interested parties. We are seeking the views of your organisation and this document contains key information about the proposed school and nursery. An opportunity to visit the school and nursery and to discuss the proposals in more detail will take place at the school on Wednesday 7 July 2010 at 8pm. Following this consultation, and taking into account views expressed, a full proposal will be published which will go through a further six week consultation period after which it will be considered by the London Borough of Barnet.

#### **2. Objectives**

Our objective is for the existing co-educational, one-form entry school and nursery at 261 Hale Lane, Edgware Middlesex HA8 8NX to enter the maintained sector by becoming a Voluntary Aided nursery and primary school. The school will cater for up to 210 children between the ages of 4-11 and the nursery will cater for 30 children aged 3-4. The school, which opened in September 2006, currently has 100 pupils across 4 school years and a nursery of 25 children.

The school and nursery will provide access for Orthodox Jewish children to Jewish and secular education within the maintained sector in response to considerable demand for such education within the London Borough of Barnet and neighbouring authorities (Hertfordshire County Council and the London Boroughs of Brent and Harrow).

The intention is to enhance the quality of education currently provided to pupils at the existing independent Edgware Jewish Primary School and nursery and to increase the diversity of provision within Barnet's maintained sector to better reflect the religious, ethnic and cultural diversity of its population.

Subject to the approval of the proposals by Barnet Council, it is proposed that the school would become maintained in 2011.

### **3. Is there a need for a new Voluntary Aided school?**

In response to a shortage of primary school provision for Orthodox Jewish families, Edgware Jewish Primary School was opened in 2006 by the Jewish Secondary Schools Movement (JSSM) in partnership with the Edgware Adath Yisroel Congregation (EAYC) and a group of concerned parents who were not able to get their children into Orthodox, independent or maintained Jewish primary schools in Barnet or the neighbouring Local Authorities.

School places in Orthodox Jewish primary schools in the London Borough of Barnet and neighbouring authorities have, for some years, been stretched to their limit. Local demand is expected to continue to increase, due to the ongoing growth of the Edgware Orthodox Jewish community.

At present, there are many pupils who attend the independent Edgware Jewish Primary School because of the shortage of suitable places within the maintained sector. Edgware Jewish Primary School itself has been oversubscribed for the last 4 years, and, in a glimpse of the problems of tomorrow, the proportion of sibling applications to the nursery class for September 2010 was already over 75%.

The existing Jewish schools within the maintained sector in the Edgware area cannot meet the requirements of the members of the observant Orthodox community. The opening of a new maintained Orthodox Jewish primary school will provide additional parental choice and diversity of school for parents in Barnet.

### **4. Is there a need for a new Voluntary Aided nursery?**

Edgware Jewish Primary School currently operates a successful private nursery for 25 children aged 3-4. The nursery, which opened with the school in September 2006, has also been oversubscribed each year and our research indicates that demand for maintained nurseries in the London Borough of Barnet which cater for Orthodox Jewish families exceeds places. We do not believe that the proposed Voluntary Aided nursery will have an impact on any private providers given the existing high demand for places.

The proposed Edgware Jewish Primary School nursery will cater for 30 children, just 5 more than the current provision, and this will be easily met by existing members of the local Orthodox community and increasing number of Orthodox families moving to the Edgware area.

### **5. Demand for Orthodox school and nursery places in the London Borough of Barnet**

The Orthodox Jewish community in the London Borough of Barnet and neighbouring local authorities has grown significantly over the last 10 years. In particular, the Orthodox Jewish community in Edgware has grown significantly. For example, the number of Orthodox synagogues in Edgware has grown by over 50% in the last 10 years. The net result has been an increase in demand for a range of local services and amenities such as synagogues, kosher shops, schools and nurseries. The lack of adequate maintained primary school and nursery places has led to the establishment of a number of

independent Orthodox primary schools and nurseries over the last five years in and around Edgware.

## **6. Effects on other schools in Barnet?**

If the full proposal is approved, Edgware Jewish Primary School will:

- take its place alongside other local schools as part of the local educational system;
- not take significant numbers of children away from other Barnet schools;
- receive the same funding as other local schools.

If the school and nursery are successful in its bid to become Voluntary Aided, Barnet's central government funding will be automatically adjusted for the extra pupils. Establishment of Edgware Jewish Primary School will not reduce funding or resources in other Barnet schools.

We believe that the proposed new school can only enrich the diversity of education already available locally.

## **7. Why should the school become Voluntary Aided?**

It has always been the intention of the school to enter the maintained sector and it was set up to mirror the curriculum, practice and policies of Voluntary Aided primary schools. The new Government is actively encouraging independent schools to move into the maintained sector (as did the previous Government) and is committed to supporting the establishment of new schools by a range of providers – including faith organisations – where local consultation has shown that this is what parents and the community want, and where this greater diversity will help to raise standards.

We believe that:

- the standards of education will be improved by entering the maintained sector. This will contribute to increased quality of opportunity and greater choices for pupils in later life;
- a move to Voluntary Aided status will enable the school to access more funding for learning resources, greater access to in-service training and professional development; and general advice and support from the Local Authority and other Barnet Schools;
- moving into the maintained sector will provide additional parental choice and diversity of school provision for Orthodox Jewish parents in Barnet, by making this type of education available to all who seek it, without the financial burden;
- the school would be strengthened by the additional resources made available within the state system;
- the school would benefit from the experiences and skills of staff at other maintained schools in Barnet.

## **8. Information about the school and nursery**

Edgware Jewish Primary School is a co-educational, one-form entry school situated at 261 Hale Lane, Edgware, Middlesex, HA8 8NX. It opened in September 2006 and now has four classes - Reception, Year 1, Year 2 and Year 3 - with a total roll of 100 pupils. The school has been oversubscribed since opening. Each year, as the school grows an additional cohort is added to the school. When the school has its full complement of 7 cohorts of children, the roll will be 210 children between the ages of 4 and 11, with 30 children in each year.

Edgware Jewish Primary School recently received a positive Ofsted report which judged overall effectiveness for the school as good and commented that the "spiritual, moral, social and cultural development is outstanding". We expect the standards of educational provision to continue to rise in the new Voluntary Aided primary school. The annual Parents Survey shows that parents are pleased with the education that their children receive. The school is a venture of the JSSM. Other JSSM schools include the Hasmonian High School and Hasmonian Primary School which are high performing maintained schools.

Edgware Jewish Primary School has a pre-school nursery for 3-4 year olds. It currently caters for 25 children and the maintained nursery will offer 30 places.

Edgware Jewish Primary School was granted planning consent to redevelop the current site in October 2008 and we hope to open the new accommodation in 2012. This will meet and exceed the sufficiency and suitability requirements as set out in legislation, by the Department for Education and by the Local Authority. The JSSM owns the freehold of the site at 261 Hale Lane, Edgware, Middlesex, HA8 8NX and is making the site available for a new school building.

### **a) Ethos and religious character of the school**

The maintained Edgware Jewish Primary School will be an Orthodox Jewish School which encourages a strong commitment to Orthodox Jewish practice, Torah values, positive citizenship and educational excellence. The teaching of Judaism will be a fundamental element of the school. The school's aim will be to offer educational excellence at all levels within an Orthodox Jewish framework.

The school will be committed to:

- promoting a lifelong love of learning;
- helping all pupils fulfil their potential and to become well rounded individuals;
- equipping children with the necessary academic and life skills needed to participate confidently in society with pride in their Jewish identity.

The school will:

- provide an outstanding and inspiring Jewish studies curriculum that is integrated with an excellent secular education;
- teach modern Hebrew as a living language;
- create a warm and friendly community school;
- work in partnership with parents to help their children learn and develop;
- add to the life and well-being of the school's local community;

- foster a safe, supportive and nurturing learning environment;
- ensure that all children have equal access to a broad and balanced curriculum;
- encourage children to have a respect for themselves and for others;
- offer care and support to children with special educational needs.

### **b) Curriculum**

The proposed new school will follow the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) and the National Curriculum. The school will:

- be fully committed to providing a broad and balanced curriculum;
- implement best practice in literacy and numeracy;
- be committed to equal opportunities for boys and girls;
- implement national and local policies in relation to pupils with special educational needs;
- proactively engage in community projects.

### **c) Admissions to the school**

The proposed admission criteria for the school are outlined in full in Annex B and will comply with all statutory requirements while recognising the ethos of the school. In brief, the policy gives priority to children with special educational needs (SEN), Jewish children in public care, children with siblings who are currently at the school, children in the nursery and children of families who regularly attend and participate at EAYC.

It is proposed that all pupils registered at the independent Edgware Jewish Primary School will transfer to the new maintained school unless their parents choose to place them elsewhere.

### **d) Special Educational Needs**

The school is aware of the responsibilities to provide education appropriate to the needs of a wide range of children, including those with special educational needs (SEN). The school already provides support for pupils with SEN mainly by in-class support or individual and small group activities where needed. Parents are fully involved in the regular reviews of pupils with special SEN.

**Annex B: Proposed admissions criteria for Edgware Jewish Primary School when it enters the Maintained Sector (NB criteria are subject to change and may be amended as part of the statutory proposals process)**

This is the comprehensive admissions policy and procedure for entry into Edgware Jewish Primary School.

This school was set up to serve the local community of Edgware Adath Yisroel congregation (EAYC) synagogue and priority for admission is given to those who regularly attend that synagogue and whose family practices Orthodox Judaism as certified by the Electoral Rabbonim of the Jewish Secondary School Movement. The decision as to whether or not an applicant qualifies for priority consideration will be based on the information provided by the applicant on the school's Supplementary Information Form ("SIF") and Certificate of Religious Practice ("CRP"). In this policy those who qualify for priority are referred to as Orthodox Jewish children and in the event of any dispute as to whether a child is an Orthodox Jewish child the ruling of the Elector Rabbis of the Jewish Secondary Schools Movement is final.

**Admissions**

1. The school has a planned admissions number of 30 children.
2. In the event that the school is over subscribed priority will be given as follows.
  - a. Looked After Orthodox Jewish children
  - b. Orthodox Jewish children with siblings who are currently at EJPS. For these purposes "siblings" shall include half-siblings, step-siblings and adopted siblings who are Orthodox Jewish children and who are living at the same address. When the over subscription criteria are applied to applications made on behalf of twins or triplets, they will be selected in random order and places will be offered accordingly (the ballot will be observed by an independent person. This could result in one or more children in a family being offered a place but not others. Where relevant, the remaining child(ren) would be retained automatically on the waiting list and would have priority should any vacancies arise at the school.
  - c. Orthodox Jewish children who are attending EJPS nursery.
  - d. Orthodox Jewish children of families who regularly attend and participate at EAYC;
  - e. Children of families who regularly attend and participate at other Orthodox synagogues;
  - f. Other Orthodox Jewish children
  - g. Other Looked After Children
  - h. Other children

3. If in any category there are more qualifying applicants than there are available places, priority will be given according to the proximity of the child's home to the school gate in Hale Lane, HA8 as measured by Barnet's measuring tool with those living nearer the school gate being accorded the higher priority; If there are two families who live in the same block of flats then those closest to the front door will have priority. If all criteria and measures are equal than a random ballot will be the tie breaker.
4. Verification of Orthodox Jewish practice will be obtained from the Rabbi of the EAYC synagogue or other Orthodox synagogue where the applicant family regularly attends. Evidence will be sought of active Orthodox synagogue worship and observance of Orthodox Jewish laws and practice.

### **Admissions Procedure**

5. All applications for places at the school must be submitted on the Barnet CAF form and, if the applicant seeks consideration for priority admission, the applicant should complete the SIF and obtain the CRP. These must be sent to the school at the same time as the CAF is completed.
6. The closing date for all applications to the reception class is 31<sup>st</sup> October in the school year (1<sup>st</sup> September to 31<sup>st</sup> August) in which the child will attain 4 years of age. Late applications will be dealt with in accordance with the London Borough of Barnet Coordinated Admissions Scheme.
7. Parents will be notified by London Borough of Barnet in accordance with its Coordinated Admissions Scheme. Parents must indicate in writing within 10 days their intention to take up a place

### **Waiting List**

8. When all available places have been filled, children not allocated places will be placed on a waiting list ranked in descending order according to the published admissions criteria. The waiting list will remain in operation from the day the original places are awarded and will be open until the end of the academic year. Those who wish to remain on the waiting list after this period will be asked annually if they wish to remain on the waiting list, if they still meet the criteria i.e. Religious commitment.

### **In-year applications and applications for places in years other than Reception**

9. These will be considered in accordance with the above oversubscription criteria in accordance with the London Borough of Barnet Coordinated Admissions Scheme. Applications must be made to London Borough of Barnet and not to the school although it will be for the Governing Body to advise London Borough of Barnet whether or not a place can be offered.

### **Special Needs**

10. Children with a statement of special educational needs that names the school will be admitted. This is a separate process to the normal admission procedure.

### **Incorrect or Misleading Applications**

11. If the information given in the application form is not accurate or up to date, your child may lose priority. In such a case, the Governors will have discretion to refuse the offer of a place. The Governors reserve the right to withdraw the offer of a place where it is found that the place was offered on the basis of fraudulent or misleading information.

### **Appeal Procedure**

12. If a place is not offered, parents will be advised as to their right to appeal to the Independent Appeal Panel and will be advised on the process for appeal.

### **EJPS Nursery**

13. Admission to the EJPS nursery will not guarantee the child a place in reception

### **Admissions Procedure**

5. If the applicant seeks consideration for priority admission, the applicant should complete the SIF and obtain the CRP. These must be sent to the school at the same time as the application.
6. The closing date for all applications to the nursery class is 31<sup>st</sup> October in the school year (1<sup>st</sup> September to 31<sup>st</sup> August) in which the child will attain 3 years of age. Late applications will be placed at the end of the waiting list (see paragraph 8).
7. Parents will be notified by nursery and must indicate in writing within 7 days their intention to take up a place.

### **Waiting List**

8. When all available places have been filled, children not allocated places will be placed on a waiting list ranked in descending order according to the published admissions criteria. The waiting list will remain in operation from the day the original places are awarded and will be open until the end of the academic year. Those who wish to remain on the waiting list after this period will be asked annually if they wish to remain on the waiting list, if they still meet the criteria i.e. Religious commitment.

### **Special Needs**

9. Children with a statement of special educational needs that names the nursery will be admitted. This is a separate process to the normal admission procedure.

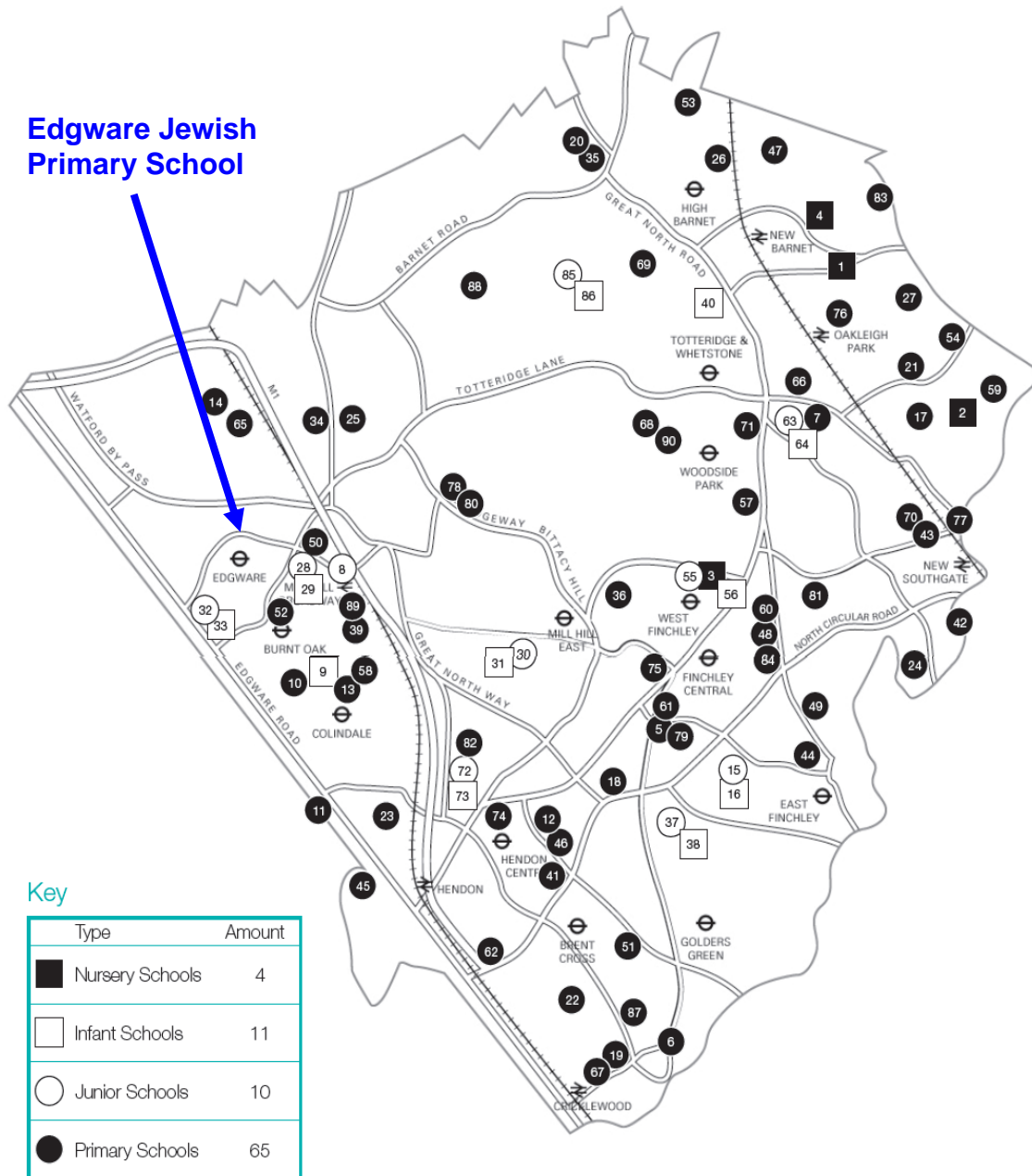
